




Students Experience Life in Colonial America!



Jordan Family Education Center!

The Jordan Family Education Center is open for family intakes and classes at their new location, West Jordan Elementary School (7220 South 2370 West). Some of the classes offered are: High School Anger Management, Self-Discipline School (grades 7-9), Calming the Storm Within (adult anger management), Bully Stoppers (bully-proofing for kids grades 2-5), Positive Parenting Practices for the Children with ADHD, Effective Parent Training, Reading Your Environment (two social skills groups for children grades 3 through 9 with high functioning autism/ asperger's) and an attendant parent support group, Parenting the Difficult Child and Teen, Blues Busters (for sad or worried children grades 3-6). 4 Things You Need to Know About Sage Testing

The results of last spring's first-ever computer-adaptive Student Assessment of Growth and Excellence (SAGE) tests were released in October. The results showed that 41.7 percent of Utah students are college and career ready in language arts, 38.7 percent in mathematics and 43.7

percent in science. Many were concerned to see these scores. Of course, we all want Utah students to perform better, but Tami Pyfer, education advisor to Gov. Gary Herbert says there are four things you need to know about Utah's new SAGE test and our student performance:

1. Comparing these new scores to the previous scores is like comparing apples to oranges.

The SAGE tests are much different from the tests students have traditionally taken. Under the new format, the way a student answers one question will determine what the next question will be. The emphasis is on ensuring students have mastered concepts rather than simply testing their ability to regurgitate information.

Though students also took computer-adaptive science assessments, the science standards have not been updated within the past five years as have the language arts and math standards.

2. More accurate assessments of performance are essential to prepare our students to compete in the marketplace.

We need to assess Utah student performance accurately so that students don't graduate from high school only to find they are unprepared for the rigor of college coursework. If students are ready for college level work when they step on campus, they will save time and money as they work toward college graduation.

3. It is not unusual to have test scores drop when standards are raised.

Spring 2014 marked the first time Utah students took computer-adaptive tests that were based on the more rigorous Utah Core Standards in language arts and math. When Utah last raised the math and science standards a few years ago test scores dropped. However, after the initial drop, test scores steadily increased. We expect the same thing to happen again.

It is important to remember we are establishing a new baseline. Going forward we will have a more accurate understanding of how Utah students are prepared to compete with their competition from other states and from other countries.

4. The test scores show we have a lot of work ahead of us.

Utah has clear, challenging academic goals. Now we have a better understanding of where we are and we can chart a course to get where we want to be.

Utah has wonderful teachers, great parents and community members and education leaders that are going to work together to help us get there.

COUNSELOR CORNER

The month of October was a busy month for the Copper Mountain Middle School counseling team. We spent the month presenting 9th grade guidance lessons, and introducing/helping 8th grade students to become college and career ready.

Guidance Lesson to 9th Graders

Damen Lopez said, "College readiness is not the belief that every student will go to college. It is the idea that every student deserves the opportunity to be educated in a way that prepares him or her for college."

The purpose of our 9th grade guidance lessons was to provide each 9th grader the opportunity to be educated in college and career readiness resources. We accomplished this goal by discussing:

How many credits a high school student will need to graduate high school in the Jordan School District (27 Credits).

Different scholarship resources and options.

What the requirements are to become a Utah Scholar and how to apply for the Regents Scholarship (www.utahscholars.org, www.higheredutah.org/regentsscholarship/).

What kind of education or skill is needed to attain a desired career (<u>www.utahfutures.org</u>).

How much money a student will need to make to live the life they desire.

8th Grader Plan for College and Career Readiness (PCCR)

The purpose of our 8th grade PCCR is to help 8th graders prepare for high school. In these one on one meetings we discuss with parents and students:

The results of the Explore Test.

How the Explore Test is a preparatory exam to help 8th graders prepare for the PLAN and ACT Test in High School.

Why the ACT Exam is so important, and how it can help a high school student get into a College or University.

How many credits a high school student needs to graduate.

Ways to earn college credit in high school.

Ways to pay for college.

Our counseling team will be conducting these PCCR Meetings until the end of December.

Emergency Communications Procedures

Copper Mountain will remain open, if at all possible, on all scheduled school days. Even when weather conditions are extreme, every effort will be made to keep schools open in the belief that it is in the best interest of the students. Since parents are the primary protector they will need to decide what is right for their children. The option to keep children home when weather conditions are extreme is always at the parents' discretion and the school understands and respects the decision.

Trust Land Funds

We wanted to take the time to let everyone know how our school has benefited from the School Trust Land funds. At Copper Mountain Middle School we provide tutoring in Mathematics, Language Arts, Science, Study Skills, Social Studies, computers, and electives. The program is structured to target those students who just need more help in their classes. Also, students struggling with attendance issues can use this time to make-up missing work.

We are dedicated to continuing implementation of middle level philosophy complete with integrated curriculum, developmentally responsive instruction, and collaboration between staff members. Funds are used for in-school mentor training with substitutes to cover, team curriculum planning, registration fees for local middle level and gifted conferences, and professional development in content specific areas. The academic goals to improve student performance at Copper Mountain are many. We also use Trust Land money to purchase mobile computer labs, interactive support for teaching, and computer equipment. Trust Land money is used for summer camps, explore programs, and remediation. Our goal in Language Arts, Math and Science are to reduce the percentage of students performing at Levels 1 and 2 on the Sage Test.

I would like to thank the School Community Council for their support, and help, in writing the School Land Trust proposal. We would also like to thank the Utah Legislators for their continued support for the School Land Trust Fund; we see tremendous benefits each year.
