This is an exciting and engaging way to get your teen to start thinking about their future career. Each grade also participates in a Career Day Activity on October 16.

Career Day – October 16

7th grade - Spy Hop Career Assembly. Students will learn what it takes to be a video game designer in this exciting and interactive assembly. Throughout this assembly, students learn about coding and programming languages while walking through the steps of developing a video game using a combination of GameMaker and life-size video game controllers. Working in groups, they explore errors in the video game and code that they have to solve to continue through the game.

8th grade - Job Shadow. Students love this career exploration activity! Their participation in the activity counts as their attendance and school assignments at school that day. Please do all you can to help your student set up a meaningful experience for Job Shadow in a career field they find interesting. If they do not have somewhere to go, they will need to complete a career packet at school.

9th Grade – Reality Town. Come join us for Reality Town on October 16 from 8:45-11:30 am. In this activity, students fill out a job application, receive a career and family situation, and learn how to budget expenses for the month. We need volunteers (see link below) to make this event a success. This is a low stress, no previous experience needed, volunteer experience that can have a profound impact on our students as they discover what it really takes to live in the real world and learn how to pay for all the things they currently take for granted.
